

ABSENTEE BALLOT APPLICATION LAWS

Who can apply for an Absentee Ballot?

Any registered voter qualified to vote in an election may request and receive a mail-in absentee ballot for the November 3, 2020 election. No special circumstance or reason is needed to receive and vote a mail-in absentee ballot.

Questions about mail-in absentee voting and deadlines should be directed to the county election office.

Follow the Law!

- 1. Never write on or alter the ballot application form in any way. The person applying to absentee vote must complete the application form and sign their name.
- 2. Never refuse a ballot application form to anyone. If a person asks for a ballot application form, you must provide one to them.
- 3. Never discourage anyone from completing a ballot application form.
- 4. Never make a copy or take a picture of a completed ballot application form.
- 5. Do not accept a complete ballot application form from a voter unless your Field Director has instructed you in writing to do so. Some states prohibit anyone but a family member of the voter from returning applications to the state

Violations of ballot application and election laws can result in fines and/or incarceration.
